PRELUDE



Encompassed by enchanting beautiful flora and fauna, the beauty of Diphu Government College is de facto beyond counting in aesthetic description. Like the erstwhile years, the Diphu Government College is heading again towards admission process for the session 2021-2022 in an already surrounding but gradually improving Covid-19 pandemic situation. Though it has really been augmented as tough time on the part of the government but no pain is spared on the part of the government to contain the adverse situation in all possible ways and specially to the best satisfaction of the innocent students and their sincere guardians so as not to incur any loss in the academic year. Accordingly, this year also the admission time has come after declaration of the results by the SEBA & AHSEC for matriculation (HSLC) and Higher Secondary Examination respectively. Due to high passing percentage the government has recently directed the intake quota of the institutions by 20% till the time of writing this "prelude" for the institution. Without education (may be formal or informal) a person is equivalent to other dull animals. Only education enlightens & opens up the real eyes. Diphu Government College has always been trying its best to transfer the best in the learning process of the students so that they can establish themselves in future as a good citizen of the country and for humanity. Expectations are always high from a section of various student organisations for getting admission into the college somehow. But due to existing government guidelines with due restrictions, the "Admission Committee" of the college has to face a lot including the head of the institution concerned from time to time. Student number is increasing but the employees are remaining in same number since 1994. A stop gap arrangement is being maintained for a considerable period of time and the government is made aware of the situation for filling up of existing retired vacancy positions along with supplement of additional faculties in various departments. Such an institution always requires very dynamic and energetic faculties to

sustain the various incipient requirements of present day competitive world. Localised thinking with parochial attitude will never do allow an existing good organisation to achieve higher level or global standard. In spite of all hurdles, the authority of the college, with the support of various organisations,--particularly the Government of Assam—has left no stone unturned to bring the name of the institution into limelight.

During the present prevalent pandemic critical time, the government has decided to run the admission process in online mode. As a result, the admission to Higher Secondary 1st year is centrally controlled for all government institutions of Assam by the AHSEC through its web portal "DARPAN" which will commence from 16-08-2021. Admission form fill up for TDC CBCS 1st Semester (Arts, Science, Commerce) has already started from 13/08/2021 from 10:00 AM. Due assistance for the purpose is also extended to non-governmental institutions also by the government, if required. As per the assessment by the government, a large number of deficiency/shortage will result for admission seekers looking for pursuing higher education. Various measures, ad-interim, have already been taken by the government to get over the situation. Diphu Government College is always committed to its goal and is ready for all possible co-operation with the government all the time.

The college has been trying to modernise the teaching-learning methodology and related other aspects from the day one of taking over charge by the present authority form the year 2012. As a pre requisite measure to achieve the goal, the college was almost fully equipped with Audio Visual classrooms with modern amenities (i.e, 09 number of Digital Classrooms out of which 03 numbers are of ultra modern digital classrooms), V-SAT, Fibre Technology Connection (under FTTH facility), modern internet facility, Biometric Attendance Recording System to streamline non-punctuality of teachers and employees, Wifi Internet connectivity to every department along with the office of the principal etc. to name a few. Lastly added most enlightened and unique part of the institution is the implementation of "Digital Library" in the college. The concept encompasses many features which requires whole-hearted & constant effort cum surveillance while implementing the system. With the moral support from the Librarian and her sincere staff along with a section of very dynamic teachers and employees, the mission became successful in the month of December, 18th, 2015. It will remain incomplete if I do not mention the funding agency of the mission. This was fully funded by the Government of Assam as a project and is implemented by the "Digital Library Implementation Committee" of the college constituted ad-hoc at that time.. This type of library is still of its first kind in the entire North-Eastern Colleges and first in

Educational Institutions of Assam including Universities & Colleges of Assam State. One great step was thus launched with a continuous effort for nearly six months in the year 2015 and the target is finally achieved. Students are already acquainted with the new facilities and the incoming students have also been expected to enjoy the modern facilities of digital library here. Many institutions are trying to imbibe and facsimile the same technology in their institutions hitherto. Genuine work by the teachers and students will do bring good name to the institution in due course. The inherent principle is that-a good college always looks for incoming of good performing students for outgoing good results. So far as the maintenance of discipline is concerned, it has the prime importance to reflect the decency of the institution and in forging the good natured human being. The upbringing of the students is reflected by his/her activities. Maintenance of cleanliness is strictly observed and menace of ragging will be seriously dealt with as per the provision of law and never be spared. Online classes are highly encouraged by the government in various orders till the ending of the present prevalent pandemic situation and the students are also showing a considerable good response. Government measures in this regard towards students is also highly commendable like free admission, time to time various pecuniary assistance to students though DBT etc to name few.

The college is expected to perform further well with the gradual termination of the present social distance maintaining situation and by direct contact with students in due time. A Music, Cultural & Aesthetic Society of the Diphu Government College Teachers is in demand of a time and is expected to be constituted ere long prima-facie entrusting the making of our **Institutional Song** by the society. PROFILE DIPHU GOVERNMENT COLLEGE

Diphu Government College is the only NAAC accredited higher educational institution in Karbi Anglong District of Assam. It was due to the pioneering efforts and visions of Lt. Chatra Sing Teron, Lt. Sai Sai Terang, Lt. Jogendra Nath Goswami, Lt. Dhoniram Rongpi, Lt. Joysing. Doloi, Lt. Sar Rongpi and Lt. Padma Kanta Barua, that the college came to be formally inaugurated on 23rd June, 1964. The College being a venture Arts College and beginning with only seven students and five teachers was taken over by the Government of Assam in the year 1967. A lot of combined creative efforts had been put together by its noble founders along with the founder Principal P.K. Bhuyan and the student leaders in converting the college into a Government College. The Science and Commerce streams were introduced in the college in the years 1979 and 1987 respectively. The College campus is located on a hillock of the District head quarter, Diphu. It has 15 Departments, around 5000 Students, one Principal (Regular), one Vice Principal (appointed by Karbi Anglong Autonomous Council: KAAC), 76 Teachers, 5 Library staff and 71 Non-teaching staff at present.

The college realizes with Dr. R. Kothari that "in the rapidly changing world of today, one thing is certain- yesterday's educational system will not meet today's and even less so, the need of tomorrow." The college is aware of the need and urgency of equipping the learners with tools required for making them compatible to the context of the ever changing global scenario. Gradual introduction of Degree programs in Arts, Science and Commerce streams is driving the college closer to the cherished goal of imparting higher education facilities in this District. Considering the parameters of employment opportunity, value addition, skill formation and global relevance, the college has been putting relentless efforts in diversifying its courses of studies/programs. The College has also been offering different courses on Computer Education for the last thirteen years. Introduction of various courses and programs in recent years proves the dynamic character of this college.

The college has an RCC two-storied building housing all the Arts and Commerce departments. There is an extended AT building which is now housing the Department of Geography, NCC office and the Cultural museum (Department of History). A separate Science Building with multi-storey provision is accommodating the Physics and Chemistry departments in the ground floor and the departments of Botany and Zoology in the first floor. Further, there is a two storied building which is accommodating IGNOU Study Centre and College Guest Rooms on the 1st floor. On the ground floor there is the College Canteen, Post Office (PIN: 782462), DGCSUS (Diphu Government College Students' Union Society) Office and a Health Centre.

The College has at present 1 (one) Principal's Residence, 3 (three) hostels: 2 (two) for girls and 1(one) for boys, 3 (three) Wardens' Residence for hostels, 23 (twenty three) Teachers' Residence and 6 (six) Non-teaching staff Residence. One new Boys' Hostel will be opened after it is fully furnished.

The College has a Science Block (another Science Block is under construction by KAAC), a Play ground, a Basket Ball court, and various indoor game facilities, a spacious Auditorium with light and sound facilities, an air conditioned Conference Hall with roof mounted LCD Projector facilities. The campus is beautified by a College Garden, a Peace Park and a solar energy park. Moreover, the college has a Digital Central Library with a stock of over 26,000 Books. Journals, Newspapers and Magazines are also available to the College community. The college provides ample opportunities to promote general, transferable skill among the students through co-curricular activities like outreach program organized by NSS wing, NCC, Debating and Extempore Speech Competitions, Wall Magazine, College Magazine, Science Journal, Arts Journal and Commerce Journal, the Annual College Week Festival, Seminars, Literary Competitions etc. A number of forums such as the Arts Society, Science Society, Commerce Society, Sahitya Chora, Planning Forum, Education Forum, History Forum, Political Science Forum, Population Education Club, Career Guidance Cell, etc. are also there. The college has instituted an innovative "Teacher-Guide Program" to guide the students in academic and other information needs.

The college is affiliated to **Assam University** (Central University), Silchar. The medium of instruction in the college is English.

The college has already successfully completed its glorious 50 years from its inception.



"EMBLEM AND MOTTO"

"MOTTO"

The motto of the college,

"ANO BHADRAH KRATAVYO YANTU VISHWATAH"

Is a Sanskrit verse taken from the Rig Veda. The meaning of the verse /motto is "Let noble thoughts come to us from every side".

EMBLEM



The emblem of the college is the *Jambili Athon*, which is also the cultural symbol of the Karbis. The Jambili Athon is an artifact, made from the wood of the Bengvoi Tree (Holarrhina antidysenterica). The artifact consists of a main stem and four branches. On the main stem, there is the Vojaru (Drongo Bird) and on the side branches are perched different kinds of birds. The Jambili Athon is ethnically decorated with beads and Sobai (Couries). According to tradition, the Vojaru stands for the Karbi King and the other birds symbolize the representatives from traditional territorial divisions of the erstwhile Karbi Kingdom. In short, the Jambili Athon reflects the socio-political structure of the Karbis. The hills in the background symbolize the traditional life of the people of Karbi Hills (Anglong). Just below the Jambili Athon is a lighted lamp which symbolizes the light of knowledge that dispels darkness and ignorance. The whole symbol is encircled by the motto and name of the college. Below the name of the college is the year of establishment. This emblem was selected for the college since the institution is situated in Karbi Anglong (Karbi Hills); a district carved out for and named after the Karbi Tribe.

SECTION: I COURSE STRUCTURE

A: PROGRAMS OF STUDY:

The college offers the following programs in all the three streams of study, namely, Arts, Science and Commerce.

1. Higher Secondary Courses (Arts, Science & Commerce)

2. B.A, B. Sc and B.Com (Three-Year Degree Courses-Semester System)

3. Self Financing Courses (Six months Certificate Courses for Degree Students)

- (i) Nursery Teacher Training (NTT)
- (ii) Certificate Course in Tourism (CCT)
- (iii) Certificate in Information Technology (CIT)
- (iv) Certificate in Spoken and Communicative English (SCE)

B: COURSES AND SUBJECTS:

1. HIGHER SECONDARY COURSES:

ARTS:

English and MIL (Assamese or Bodo) are core subjects and are compulsory. In addition, a candidate must select three elective subjects from the following subjects:

(i) Economics (ii) Political Science (iii) Adv. Assamese/History (iv) Geography (v) Adv. Assamese/Logic and Philosophy (vi) Education

In addition to the three elective subjects, a candidate may study a fourth elective subject.

SCIENCE:

English and MIL (Assamese/Bodo) are core subjects and are compulsory. In addition, a candidate must select three elective subjects from the following group:

Group: (i) Physics (ii) Chemistry (iii) Mathematics (iv) Biology or Geography

COMMERCE:

English and MIL (Assamese/Bodo) are core subjects and are compulsory. In addition, a candidate must study (i) Business Studies (ii) Accountancy (iii) Economics as compulsory elective subjects and either (i) CAES or (ii) Mathematics as an optional fourth elective subject.

NOTE: All Higher Secondary Students, irrespective of streams, desiring to offer MIL other than Assamese and Bodo (like Hindi Bengali, Manipuri, Nepali, Hmar, etc.) may do so, under the guidance of teachers of the respective subjects. At the time of filling up the examination form, he/she must attach a certificate to this effect and pay a non-collegiate fee to be fixed by College.

THREE-YEAR DEGREE COURSE (TDC) (B.A., B.Sc. & B.Com.) under CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM (CBCS): Definitions:

- Choice Based Credit System (CBCS): CBCS is a flexible system of learning that permits students to learn at their own pace and choose electives from a wide range of elective courses offered by the Higher Educational Institutions, adopt an inter-disciplinary approach in learning, and make the best use of the expertise of available faculty. Under CBCS, the requirement for awarding a degree/ diploma/ certificate is prescribed in terms of number of credits to be completed by the students.
- Programmes of Study: Programmes of Study means an educational programme under a set of required number of semesters leading to award of a Degree, Diploma etc.
- Duration of Programme: Duration of Programme means the period of time required for the completion of the programme.
- Semester: Semester is the period of academic activities into which an academic year is divided pertaining to academic activities of a year. Depending upon duration, each academic year is divided into two semesters Odd and Even Semesters. Two consecutive (odd and even) semesters constitute one Academic Year. Total teaching days in each semester is divided into 3 (three) components—(i)classroom lectures, (ii) tutorials consisting of elaborate instructions on specific topics from classroom lectures and (iii) laboratory or field exercises in which the student has to do experiments or other practical works respectively.
- End Semester Examination (ESE): End Semester Examination is the examination conducted by the University at the end of each semester.

- Course: Course in simple terms corresponds to the word 'subject' used currently an essential constituent of a programme of study. The courses should define learning objectives and learning outcomes. A course may be designed to comprise of lectures/ tutorials/ laboratory-work/ field-work/outreach-activities/ dissertation/ project-work/ vocational training/seminars/ assignments/ presentations etc., or a combination of some of them. Courses in a programme of study may be of 4 (four) types viz.,
 - 1. Core,
 - 2. Elective,
 - 3. Dissertation/ Project Work and
 - 4. Ability Enhancement Courses.
- Core Course: This is the course which is to be compulsorily studied by a student as a core requirement to complete a programme in a specific discipline of study. The purpose of keeping Core Course in a programme of study is to ensure that all the institutions follow a minimum common curriculum so that each institution adheres to common minimum standard. Also, the course designed for papers under this category aim to cover the basics that a student is expected to imbibe in that particular discipline. Language Course (English/ Hindi/ MIL) are treated as Core Courses.
- Elective Courses: Generally, a course which can be chosen from a pool of courses and which may be very specific or specialized or advanced or supportive to the discipline/ subject of study or which provides an extended scope, or which enables an exposure to some other discipline/ subject/ domain or nurtures the students' proficiency/skill is called an Elective Course and these are of 3 (three) kinds:
 - 1. **Discipline Specific Elective (DSE) Courses**: Elective courses offered under the main discipline of study are referred to as Discipline Specific Elective Courses.
 - 2. Generic Elective (GE) Courses: An elective course chosen from an unrelated discipline/subject, with an intention to seek exposure beyond discipline/s of choice is called a Generic Elective. The purpose of this category of courses is to offer the students the option to explore disciplines of interest beyond the choices they make in Core and Discipline Specific Elective Courses. A Core Course offered in a programme of study may be treated as a Generic Elective Course, that is, a core course, offered in a subject, may be treated as a Generic Elective by another subject.
 - 3. Additional GE Course (AGE): A student may take one more Generic Elective Course as an "Additional Generic Elective Course" (AGE). This additional course shall be treated as GE Course in all respects but performance under such additional course shall NOT be considered for calculation of SGPA/ CGPA/ Award of Degree. The purpose of this category of course is to provide students a wider option to supplement their studies of a Core Course. There shall be equal weightage of CCA for the "Additional GE Course" (AGE).
- Dissertation/ Project Work: Dissertation/ Project Work is considered as a special course involving application of knowledge in solving/analyzing /exploring a real-life situation/ difficult problem. A Dissertation/Project Work is an optional paper and may be given in lieu of a Discipline Specific Elective (DSE) in the 6th semester.
- > Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC): AEC are of two kinds:
 - 1. Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC) are the compulsory courses based upon the content that leads to knowledge enhancement. These are mandatory for all disciplines.
 - 2. Skill Enhancement Courses (SECs) are the compulsory value based and/or skill-based aimed at providing hands-on-training, skills, etc. The main purpose of these courses is to provide students life-skills in hands-on mode so as to increase their employability.

- Course Number: Course Number shall be an alphanumeric-code for semester-wise representation of a particular course of different kinds namely Core, Language, Elective, Dissertation/ Project Work and Ability Enhancement Courses under a programme of study.
- Paper Code: Paper Code shall be an alphanumeric-code for semester-wise representation of different papers of a course.
- Credit (CR): A unit by which the course work is measured. It determines the number of hours of instructions required per week. 'Credit' refers to the weightage given to a course, usually in terms of the number of instructional hours per week assigned to it. Credits assigned for a single course always pay attention to how many hours it would take for an average learner to complete a single course successfully.
- Credit Point (CP): Credit Point is the product of Grade Point and number of Credit for a course, thus, CP = GP x CR.
- Grade Point (GP): Grade Point is a numerical weight allotted to each Grade Letter on a 10point scale.
- Letter Grade (LG): Letter Grade is an index of the performance of students in a said paper of a particular course. Grades are denoted by letters O, A+, A, B+, B, C, P, F and Ab. A student obtaining Grade F / Grade Ab shall be considered failed/absent and, will be required to appear in the subsequent ESE. The UGC recommends a 10-point grading system with the following Letter Grades:

- Continuous and Comprehensive Assessment (CCA): CCA is a parameter to assess learners' performance continuously and comprehensively internally by the colleges throughout the semester. It is also known as Internal Assessment.
- Relative Grading System (RGS): RGS is a method of calculation for awarding overall grades for a course or a programme of study. The relative grading (RGS) is based on the distribution (usually normal distribution) of marks obtained by all the students of the course and the grades are awarded based on a cut-off marks or percentile.
- Absolute Grading System (AGS): AGS is a method of calculation for awarding overall grades for a course or a programme of study. Under the absolute grading (AGS), the marks are converted to grades based on predetermined class intervals.
- Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA): SGPA is a measure of performance of work done in a semester. It is the ratio of total credit points secured by a student in various courses registered in a semester and the total course credits taken during that semester.
- Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA): CGPA is a measure of overall cumulative performance of a student over all the semesters. The CGPA is the ratio of total credit points secured by a student in various courses and the sum of the total credits of all courses in all the semesters.

DURATION OF PROGRAMME OF STUDY:

- ✓ Each academic year of the TDC (CBCS) programme of study shall be divided into two semesters. The first academic year shall comprise the first and second semesters, the second academic year the third and fourth semesters and, the third academic year the fifth and sixth semesters respectively.
- ✓ The odd and even semesters shall consist of the period as per the Academic Calendar published by the University.
- ✓ Maximum duration for the completion of a TDC (CBCS) programme of study is5 (five) years at a stretch from the date of admission (i.e., 10 (ten) consecutive End Semester Examinations) as per the "Guidelines on Determination of a Uniform Span Period within which a Student may be allowed to Qualify for a Degree" published by UGC dated October 15, 2015. This criterion shall be strictly adhered to while determining the eligibility to appear in any ESE for Arrear Paper/s, and Betterment Examination.

SCHEDULE OF CLASSES:**

(i) 1st, 3rd and 5th semester classes from 1st October.

(ii)2nd, 4th and 6th Semester classes from 1st March.

Classes shall be continued till 15 days before commencement of the examinations.

EXAMINATION SCHEDULE:**

Tentative schedules of examinations are as under:

- (iii) Odd Semester: February to March
- (iv) Even Semester: August to September

**Subject to change as per the incoming changing guidelines of late in force and as per NEP.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR ADMISSION IN EXAMINATIONS:

(i) A candidate should have 75% of attendance both in theory and practical papers. 65% attendance may be considered only on special circumstances and on certification by the Principal.

- (ii) A candidate shall have to qualify in the unit tests securing at least 40% marks.
- (iii) A candidate shall be allowed to appear in those papers only in which he/she has secured qualifying marks in unit test.
- (iv) If a candidate after taking admission in 1st semester could not continue the classes or could not obtain eligibility to appear in the 1st semester examinations, in such cases the student will not be allowed to continue in second semester and he/ she has to take fresh admission in 1st semester again in next academic year.

LECTURE PERIODS / CLASSES:

There shall be a minimum of 50 lecture Periods/ Classes for theory papers in pass Course and 60 Lecture Periods/ classes in Honours Course. Minimum of 20-30 hours shall be for each practical paper. This shall be strictly adhered to.

PROMOTION RULES:

(a) A candidate is eligible to continue the second semester classes immediately after the 1st semester examinations and can appear in the 2nd semester examinations notwithstanding the number of arrear papers in 1st semester provided he/she must have appeared in the 1st semester examinations.

- (b) A candidate will be promoted to 3rd semester with not more than two back papers of 1st semester and he/she will continue to attend classes of 3rd Semester provisionally. He/ she will be allowed to get final admission in the 3rd semester with maximum of four back papers in all in 1st semester and 2nd semester.
- (c) A candidate will be promoted to 4th semester with not more than two back papers in 2nd semester and he/she will be allowed to attend classes of 4th semester provisionally. He/ she will be allowed to get final admission in the 4th semester with maximum of four back papers in all in 2nd semester and 3rd semester.
- (d) A candidate will be promoted to 5th semester with not more than two back papers of 3rd semester and he/she will continue to attend classes of 5th semester provisionally. He/ she will be allowed to get final admission in the 5th semester with any number of back papers of 4th semester and only two back papers of 3rd semester.
- (e) A candidate will be promoted to 6^{th} semester with not more than two back papers of 4^{th} semester. He/ she will be allowed to take admission finally in the 6^{th} semester with any number of back papers of 5^{th} semester and only two back papers of 4th semester.

(f) Elaboration of promotional rules:

- 1. For admission in 3rd Semester, maximum no of back papers in 1st Semester & 2nd Semester is 4 provided that there are not more than 2 back papers of 1st Semester. In case there is no back paper in 1st Semester, a student can be promoted to 3rd semester with maximum of 4 back papers of 2nd semester.
- 2. For admission in 4th semester, all papers of 1st semester must be cleared and not more than 2 back papers of 2nd semester and in total not more than 4 back papers in 2nd and 3rd semester. If 1st and 2nd semester is cleared a student can be promoted with maximum of 4 back papers of 3rd semester.
- 3. For admission in 5th semester, 1st and 2nd semester must be cleared. Not more than 2 back papers of 3rd semester and any number of back papers of 4th semester.
- 4. For admission in 6th semester, 1st, 2nd and 3rd semester must be cleared. Not more than 2 back papers of the 4th semester and any number of back papers of 5th semester.
- 5. After completion of 6th semester examination, if a student still has got back papers, in 4th, 5th and 6th semester, he must clear all these back papers within 12 semesters from the date of admission in 1st semester to obtain the degree. If he fails to complete the course within 12 semesters, he should take readmission in 1st semester.
- **Note:** A candidate will be considered eligible to sit for the 6th semester examination with not more than six (06) back papers of earlier semester classes excluding fifth semester.

Other Guidelines:

- (i) There will be no provision for Repeat or Betterment i.e. scope for appearing in any paper again for obtaining better marks.
- (ii) A candidate has to clear all the papers within 12 semesters (six years) from the year of first admission in the programme.
- (iii) There will be no provision of examination for certain subject in the new pattern

- (iv) Non-collegiate private candidate, as per ordinance, may appear in the TDC examinations choosing only non-practical subjects in the new system like that of regular pass course students.
- (v) Dropping of Honours: Dropping of Honours shall be allowed in 1st semester of the course but within one month from the date of regular admission in the semester. A candidate who is allowed to drop the Honours must clear the respective pass paper(s) of the corresponding Honours subject as back paper(s). Change of Honours subject/ Group shall not be allowed after first semester examinations. Dropping of Honours will be allowed upto 2nd Semester and the same will not be entertained from 3rd Semester onwards.
- (vi) The system of credit of internal assessment marks in the final mark sheet shall be introduced after its formal approval by the university authorities.
- vii) The system of Choice based credit system and Gradation system shall be introduced after its formal approval by the university authority.

There shall be only two programmes of study under TDC (CBCS) namely, TDC (CBCS) Honours and TDC (CBCS) general programmes.

TDC (CBCS) Honours programme:

Course-wise distribution of number of papers credits and marks to choose one Honours subject & another subject. Another subject other than Honours subject should be from the same stream as that of the Honours subject. However, Geography can be chosen as another subject by a student having Honours in any Arts and Science subjects.

RESTRICTION/RECOMMENDATION IN COMBINATION OFCOURSES:

Students shall **NOT** be allowed to choose the following combination of courses:

- 1. Same course (subject) as Core Course and Generic Elective (GE) Course.
- 2. Either any two Language Courses or any two Classical Courses either as Core & Generic Elective (GE) Course or *vice-versa*.
- 3. Political Science and Public Administration either as Core & Generic Elective (GE) Course or *vice-versa*.

Additional Generic Elective Course (AGE) Course may be allowed for the following combinations:

- 1. Mathematics as one of the GE and Chemistry/Computer Science/Economics/Geology/Physics/Statistics as AGE.
- 2. Chemistry as one of the GE andBotany/ Ecology & Environmental Science/ Bio-Technology/ Zoology as AGE.
- 3. More combinations to allow AGECourse may be recommended by the College.

Different components and distribution of marks for Continuous and Comprehensive Assessment (CCA):

Full Marks & Pass Marks for CCA (Unit Test + Attendance)

Courses with only Theory paper:

Full Marks = (Unit Test: 20 + Attendance: 10) = 30 (thirty); Pass Marks = 12 (twelve)

Courses with both Theory & Practical papers: Full Marks = (Unit Test: 14 + Attendance: 06) = 20 (twenty); Pass Marks =08 (eight).

UNIT TEST:

Maximum marks:

Courses with only Theory paper = 20 (twenty);

Courses with both Theory & Practical papers = 14 (fourteen)

There shall be **two Unit Tests** per semester for each and every **theory paper** *excluding* **Ability Enhancement Compulsory Course (AECC) and Skill Enhancement Course (SEC)** and, dates of such tests shall be notified by the Controller of Examinations. The highest mark scored by a student out of two Unit Tests shall be awarded to the student as the marks under Unit Test of CCA. There shall be NO Unit Test for practical paper and theory papers of AECC and SEC.

Unit Test may preferably be conducted during non-allotted classes, so that, total number of allotted classes (Lecture/ Tutorial/Practical) are not curtailed. Setting of question paper and evaluation of answer scripts of Unit Test shall be done by the teachers of the concerned department of college. Marks obtained by the students be announced within one week of the Unit Test. If demanded, answer scripts of Unit Test be shown to students.

Marks scored in Unit Test for which the student appears as an "Arrear Paper" shall be carried over for declaring the result of concerned "Arrear Paper"—if the student secures Pass marks in the Unit Test else he/ she shall have to appear in Unit Test/s in the concerned paper along with the regular students.

Mark sheets of CCA of each semester shall be dispatched to the University by colleges during the period of End Semester Theory Examination for the concerned semester in the prescribed format and, in the most confidential manner before the completion of that End Semester Examination (ESE).

CLASS ATTENDANCE:

Class Attendance shall be calculated on the basis of actual number of classes held during each semester in each course/ paper. Number of decimal be rounded off to next higher number (e.g.,74.01% be rounded off to 75%).

Marks once by the concerned department, the marks under CCA shall be the final and binding to all concerned.

A student with less than 75% of attendance on average of all the papers (excluding "Additional GE Course, if any) of the concerned semester shall NOT be allowed to appear in that End Semester Examination (ESE) but will be allowed to get admission in the immediate next higher semester. However, such a student may appear in the subsequent similar ESE (odd/even) in all the papers and, marks to be awarded under CCA for each paper shall be the marks previously secured by the student in the concerned paper.

Note: Marks under CCA shall be carried forward as per above rule only if the student secure Pass marks in the Unit Test/s else he/she shall have to appear in Unit Test/s in the concerned paper along with the regular students in the concerned semester.

SECTION: II ADMISSION PROCEDURE

Who can apply?

Candidates who have passed HSSLC or equivalent Examination from recognized Board/University in the last **two years** are eligible to apply. Preference will be given to the candidates of Assam State. However, wards of Businessmen and employees serving in Assam will be considered as the candidates of the State provided they produce the necessary documents. **How to apply?**

Eligible candidates may apply online through the following link: https://forms.gle/bD8MV7vQ4f7AH5xU6 which is also available in our college website diphugovernmentcollege.com

The starting & last date of submission of admission form duly filled up for TDC (CBCS) first semester (Arts/ Science/Commerce) will be intimated very soon. Aspiring candidates are informed hereby watchful for this.

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Selection Criteria:

- 1. Admission to all courses of study is made strictly on the basis of merit, i.e., the percentage of marks obtained in the last qualifying examination.
- 2. Reservation of seats will be as per following norms:
- a) There is a provision for reservation of seats, as per Govt. of Assam rules [OBC/MOBC: 15%, SC: 7%, ST (P):10% & ST (H):5%]. For SC, ST (P), ST (H), OBC/MOBC candidates belonging to the state of Assam, caste certificate issued by the competent authority under Govt. of Assam only shall be valid. However, after filling up the reserved seats, if any of the seats found lying vacant, it will be filled up by ST (H) candidates.
- b) 3% seats are reserved for Differently Abled Candidates.
- c) 5 seats are reserved for the candidates from other Boards/States (Science: 01, Arts: 03 & Commerce: 01).
- **d**) A very limited number of seats are reserved for candidates having proven outstanding performance in co-curricular activities like sports, cultural and literary activities and depending on availability.
- e) There is also reservation of seats for the children of college employees. However, all selections under reserved quota will be based on merit basis.
- **f**) Any other quota introduced by the government during the course of admission or before completion of admission will be duly acknowledge and complied.
- **g**) In all cases, the decision of the Admission Committee will be final and binding through the head of the institution. Due and necessary care will be paid in this regard.
- 3. For selection of Honours course in any subject, the concerned department will issue Guidelines.
- 4. Those candidates who passed the last qualifying exam from the Board/Council outside of Assam state but whose parents are permanent resident of Assam or working in Assam or doing business in Assam, are to provide PRC of Assam or other valid documents justifying their PRC.
- 5. The candidates seeking admission to TDC First semester must pass the last qualifying Exam not before 2019. The candidates, who passed the last qualifying Exam in 2019and 2020 and applying for

admission, must produce *GAP CERTIFICATE in ORIGINAL* along with the application form. The competent authority from whom GAP CERTIFICATE should be obtained is as follows:

a) Medical officers not below the rank of Medical Superintendent with his/her contact number certifying the duration of treatment of the disease/malady.

b) The Head Master/Principal where the candidates studied last, certifying that the candidate is well known to him/her along with the contact number.

c) The Block Development officer certifying that the candidate is well known to him/ her along with the contact number.

d) Any candidate working for short-term course must be certified by the institutional regional head of the course/organisation.

6. Presently, the entire admission process is under the control of the government of Assam, the college has almost no role to play except to approve the merit list prepared by government under procedure for final selection for admission into HS 1st year (Arts, Science & Commerce) following the directions of the government in all cases in the present Covid-19 pandemic situation.

7. Passing from repugnant institution/Board will not be entertained.

8. The candidates passed under *COMPARTMENTAL* will *NOT BE ENTITLED* for admission.

- 9. The rules or other regulations will remain almost more or less same as enshrined or incorporated in the last year prospectus.
- 10. For further details one can contact the office of Diphu Government College during office hours with the compliance of social distancing, wearing mask etc. keeping consonants with the Covid-19 pandemic situation and strict adherence to the existing SOPs of Government.

E: Post Admission Duties:

- 1. Admitted Students seeking subject change will have to apply to the Principal, DGC within 30 days of admission. Such applications must be approved by the competent authority. As per AHSEC/AU rules, no such application will be entertained after 30 days from the date of admission.
- 2. Candidates seeking Honours Course will have to procure prescribed application forms issued by the concerned departments which will select candidates as per the guidelines of the departments. Selected candidates will have to deposit the required amount as Honours Fee at the office of the Principal, DGC. On production of such receipt concerned department will enroll their names in Honours register.
- 3. Registration Form after being duly filled up by the candidates must be submitted to the Office of the Principal, DGC on dates notified later on.
- 4. Ignorance of any rules will not be entertained as a plea for violation of any rules.
- 5. The Prospectus shall not be treated as document. The rules, clauses, policies indicated in the Prospectus are only for general information and may be modified /changed from time to time by the appropriate authority.

SECTION: III

STUDENT SUPPORT FACILITIES

A: HOSTEL ACCOMMODATION:

The college has two Girls' Hostels and one Boys' Hostel with the capacity of 70 (seventy) seats in each Hostel. Candidates may apply for the Hostel seats in prescribed Admission Form available at the Office of the Principal, DGC. However, admission to a course of study in the college does not bestow any guarantee or right for Hostel accommodation. Each Hostel is provided with a common mess, for which the boarders are required to pay a certain mess fee as fixed by a committee under the supervision of the Hostel Superintendent.

B: IDENTITY CARD:

At the time of admission, each and every student shall be provided with an Identity Card, and he/she shall carry it at the time of attending the classes. An Identity Card is valid for one academic session. On expiry of the Identity Card, it has to be surrendered for renewal. Loss of Identity Card should be reported to the Police immediately. A duplicate Identity Card shall be issued to the student on receipt of the Police Report and on payment of Rs. 100/- (One hundred) only.

C: LIBRARY:

Central Library, DGC was started with the establishment of the college, as an information centre for meeting the information requirements of the academic community of the college. The main functions of the library include collection and development of knowledge resources, retrieval and dissemination of information to the end users including the academic community.

The Central Library of the College is upgraded to Digital Central Library in 2015.

A student can borrow books from the library for a period of 15 days from the date of issue. A fine of Re.1/- per day will be imposed if a book is not returned within 15 days. Library Card(s) is/ are issued to students and they can borrow books against the card.

1. Higher Secondary Students: One card each and two books against it.

- 2. TDC (Pass) students: One Card each and four books against it.
- 3. TDC (Hons) students: One Card each and six books against it.

LIBRARY TIMING:

Library Hours:10.00 AM to 4.30 PMReading Hours:11.00 AM to 3.00 PMLibrary visitors are to sign a Library Register at the Library entrance.

LIBRARY SERVICES:

- 1. Wi-fi internet connection.
- 2. Document search through OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue).
- 3. User can issue/ return documents (books) through self service process.
- 4. Central Library and Information Services organises Book Exhibition every year.
- 5. Display of News Papers clippings and career/employment information on display board for the readers.
- 6. Users Suggestions are received through a Suggestion Box and the concerned authority respond them timely.
- 7. Conducting user survey periodically "Annual Best User Award" for students has been instituted to motivate the user to the library.

D: SCHOLARSHIP :

Various Scholarships are available as per Govt. rules. Scholarship money is directly credited to the students' respective bank accounts.

E: STUDENTS AID FUND:

The college has a "Students' Aid Fund". Deserving and meritorious students coming from economically weaker sections of the society are given financial aid out of this fund, provided they do not avail any other kind of scholarship.

F: STUDENTS' TRAVEL CONCESSION:

Students are entitled to Travel Concession by Rail on their way home from the institution and during vacation only.

G: CAREER AND PLACEMENT CELL:

The college has a Career Guidance Cell that organizes group counseling sessions to provide career and academic guidance to students. Students may consult Career Guide Books in the Cell. The cell is constituted with the following faculty members.

SECTION: IV

INTERNAL EXAMINATION AND PROMOTION RULES

A: EXAMINATION RULES:

i) College Examinations

- a) All students must appear in Unit/Terminal/Selection Test Examinations conducted by the college. No student shall be allowed to fill up the final examination form without passing in test examinations. In case of illness, sick bed will be provided.
- b) The following examinations will be conducted by the College during an academic year:

Class

- (i) HS 1st Year
- (ii) HS 2nd Year
- (iii) TDC semester Classes

Examination

Terminal, Test and Promotion Exam Terminal and Pre Final Examination. Two unit Tests in each semester

- c) The suitability of the students to appear at the final examination with subject(s) having practical will be decided on the basis of their regularity and performance in the laboratory work. Those found below standard will not be allowed to appear at the final examination.
- d) For all the College examinations, pass marks as laid down by AHSEC/Assam University will be taken as standard for selection test. Relaxations, if any, will be decided by the "Committee for finalization of results of selection test examination."
- e) Absence from the selection test examination shall mean detention but under special circumstances may be considered on the merit of the periodical examination. No such consideration will be made in case of students attending below 75% classes in respect of both Higher Secondary and Three Year Degree Course students. Students declared as discollegiate are debarred from appearing in the test examination.
- Result of defaulters on account of College, Hostel, NCC, Sports, Student's Union, Library matters will be kept withheld.
- g) Re-admission of unsuccessful students will be governed by "College Admission Rules".
- h) Expulsion from any examination will lead to the expulsion from the College.

ii) Promotion Rules for HS First Year:

- a) The promotion Examination for HS First Year will be conducted by the college as per instruction prescribed by AHSEC, Guwahati.
- b) The Promotion Examination will be held both in Theory & Practical as per mark pattern prescribed by the AHSEC.
- c) The promotion to HS Second Year will be given on the basis of Grade A, B, C, or D which will be as follows:
- d) Grade A: Duly Pass & total mark scored 300 or more.
- e) Grade B: Duly Pass & total mark scored 250 or more but less than 300
- f) Grade C: Duly pass & total mark scored 150 or more but less than 250
- g) Grade D: Promoted under consideration.
- h) No promotion will be considered under MEDICAL GROUNDs.
- i) Student must appear the exam in all CORE and ELECTIVE SUBJECTS and must score minimum qualifying marks for promotion.

NOTE:

- "Failed students" may get re-admitted into the same class as "casual students" subject to availability of seats. However, they cease to be bonafide students of the college.
- 2. H.S. students must complete his/her courses within 5(five) years from the date of registration.
- 3. TDC students must complete his/her courses within 6(six) years from the date of admission in TDC-I.

SECTION: V HEALTHY PRACTICES

The College has devised the following healthy practices to reflect its mission, philosophy and vision.

1. Hygiene:

A neat and clean environment leaves a strong positive bearing in the minds of the stakeholders' viz. the students, teachers and other members of an educational Institution. It is the duty of every student to keep the college campus beautiful and attractive.

2. Academic:

There should be calm, cool and congenial environment in an institution of higher education for academic pursuit. Diphu Government College is to play the lead role in this hill district. It must shoulder the responsibility of providing academic leadership to the academic fraternity. Towards this end, the college authority organizes district level workshops/Seminars, wherein the members of social organizations, journalists, teachers, lawyers, students and youth organizations, leading citizens, guardians, administrators, educationists and the like, participate, deliberate, give suggestions and adopt follow-up actions based on consensus for the conducive academic environment in the district.

3. Career Guidance:

The college is offering career and academic counselling facilities to the students. The Career Guidance Cell has a good collection of books and brochures on career options. The Cell organizes counselling sessions not only in the college but also outside the college. The Faculty of the Career Guidance Cell is also invited by various organizations to act as Resource Persons in the career counselling sessions. The Cell conducts coaching programmes at the college for Engineering and Medical Entrance Tests for the benefit of students.

4. Earner-Learner Scheme (Extension Program):

The college offers three self-financing need-based certificate and diploma courses on Journalism, Tourism and Nursery Teachers Training to the in-service and interested persons under the Earner-Learner Scheme (ELS). The Courses are progressive in nature and have tremendous value addition aspects apart from employment/self-employment potentials. However, these courses are now deactivated.

5. Publication:

The college has two ongoing publications:

6. Teacher Guide Program:

About 90% of the students enrolled in Diphu Govt. College come from rural areas. Many of them are first generation college gores. Most of their parents are illiterate and ignorant about the need demands of formal higher education system. Many of the students, it is observed, tend to neglect or become oblivious of their primary duty of STUDYING after being acclimatized in the college campus. It has been noticed on many occasions that many of the students commit grave mistakes with respect to their Academic, Examination, Office and University related works due to lack of proper guidance and timely warning from teachers, guardians, etc. The students fail to optimise and get the benefit of the available learning resources on account of ignorance. As such a TEACHER-GUIDE PROGRAMME has been conceptualised and subsequently instituted from the academic session 2005-06 in order to legitimise the teacher-student interface so that the student community is benefited of effective guidance, advice etc from the teachers.

Under the TEACHER-GUIDE PROGRAMME, a teacher (excluding the contractual teachers) would guide a group of students of about 30 to 40. Other things remaining the same (such as workable size of the group), effort has been made to constitute groups belonging to the same stream. The guiding activities will be confined within the objectives and areas mentioned as follows: class attendance monitoring, guiding co-curricular activities, career guidance and counselling, library use guidance, examination related guidance, college related information, and any other viewed necessary to better college academic performance. The success of the TEACHER-GUIDE PROGRAMME will depend mostly on student's perception and initiative.

7. Outreach Programme:

The college authority always encourages outreach Programme such as Community Service, Poor Students Aid, Medical Camp, National Integration Camp, Literacy Drive, Blood Donation, Water Quality Improvement, Plantation Drive, Anti- Cruelty to Animal, Environment Awareness, AIDS Control & Anti-drug, Students Exchange Program, Science Exhibition, and the like.

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8. Attendance of students in lectures/Laboratory works, Tutorial classes and appearance in the Terminal/Test Examinations are compulsory. Only those students attending individual classes up to 75% or above are allowed to appear the AHSEC/Assam University examinations. For irregular students, specific University or Council's regulations shall be applied.

13. Anti-ragging measures:

As per the order of the Hon'ble Supreme Court of India and recommendations of RK Raghavan Committee, the following measures have been followed to deal with the menace of ragging in the college.

Introduction:

Now a days, Ragging means "Display of noisy, disorderly conduct, teasing, excitement by rough or rude treatment or handling, indulging in rowdy, undisciplined activities which cause or likely to cause annoyance, undue hardship, physical or psychological harm or raise apprehension or fear in a fresher, or asking the students to do any act or perform some which such a student will not dot in the ordinary course and which cause him/her or embarrassment or danger to his/her life"

This institution considers ragging in any form a cognizable offence and really means business and will not hesitate to take stern action against the offenders.

A Vigilance & Disciplinary Committee, DGC consisting of senior faculty members, some hostel authorities like wardens and a few responsible senior students has been constituted to have an in-built mechanism for checking the incidence of ragging. The committee will monitor the events involving ragging, enquire into them, make recommendation and spell out the punishments in this regard to the institution authorities.

Anti-ragging Squad, DGC which was working under DGCSUS previously has been rejuvenated with the inclusion of more individuals like senior teachers, members of DGCSUS, teacher i/c NCC and rank holder cadets which will make sudden raids on vulnerable spots.

The institution guarantees care and safety to the Freshers. The freshers' are not to fear any atrocities from the so-called 'seniors'.

Fresher should report incidents of ragging as immediately as possible. Those, who do not do so, even when being witnesses or victims will be punished.

Punishments:

The following could be the possible punishments for those who are found guilty of participation in or abetment of ragging. The quantum of punishment shall, naturally, depend upon the nature and gravity of the offence as established by the Disciplinary Committee or the Court of Law.

- 1. Cancellation of Admission.
- 2. Suspension from attending classes.
- 3. Withholding/withdrawing scholarship and other benefits.
- 4. Debarring from appearing in any test/examination or other evaluation process.
- 5. Withholding of results.
- 6. Debarring from representing the institution in any national or international events.
- 7. Suspension/ expulsion from the hostel.
- 8. Rustication from the institution which may extend from 1 to 2 years.
- 9. Expulsion from the institution and consequent debarring from admission to any other institution.
- 10. Fine up to Rs. 25,000/-
- 11. Rigorous imprisonment up to three years.

While the first 10 types of punishment can be awarded by the appropriate authority of the institution itself, the last punishment can be awarded only by a court of law.
